

Interesting Facts: Community Welfare officers who work for the Department of Social Protection are available to assist people who have suffered from Storm Eowyn. The Humanitarian Assistance Scheme can provide support for replacement of goods and more extensive longer-term support under the following different stages. Stage 2 involves the replacement of white goods, basic furniture items and other essential household items. Stage 3 is to identify what longer term financial support is required, including plastering, dry lining, relaying of floors, electrical re-wiring and painting. Income limits for stage 2 and 3 of these supports are: €50,000 for a single person; €90,000 for a couple and €15,000 per dependent child. Reduced or tapered level of support may be provided in cases where a household 's income is above these limits. The level of payment depends on how severe the damage is and a person's ability to meet these costs

St, Brigid. As we celebrate St. Brigid's day let us remember that little is known of the Irish saint that can be confirmed, it is widely accepted that some of the stories about her life overlap with the Celtic Pagan Goddess Brigid. Brigid (or Brigit) from pre-Christain early medieval Ireland. She is an established member of Irish mythology as part of the ancient mythical race of fairies, the Tuatha Dé Danann. Often called a "mother goddess," her feast day is also February 1st, or the ancient pagan festival of Imbolc – the celebration of the end of winter and the coming of spring. With similar attributes to the saint, Celtic Brigid is associated with wisdom, poetry, healing, protection, smithing and domesticated animals. It is easy to see the overlap.
